What is pupil premium ?

The pupil premium is allocated to schools to raise the attainment for disadvantaged pupils in all year groups. Funding is for children who are registered for free school meals, children who are looked after or adopted and children from service families

Why was the pupil premium introduced?

The government introduced Pupil Premium, in addition to main school funding, to address the inequalities between children eligible for Free School meals and looked after children and their peers. Schools are free to spend the pupil premium as they see fit but they must publish on line how the premium has been used.

What is our pupil premium allocation?

How is our Pupil Premium funding used?

During 2016 - 17, we plan to use the pupil premium in the following ways:

ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant)

To support children experiencing emotional, behaviour or self esteem issues. Children may meet with the ELSA occasionally, regularly or for a block of time to address a particular need.

Sometimes the ELSA liaises with LSAs to continue further work in class.

Specific support groups.

These are flexible and address ongoing needs

They include:

Maths support groups.

Catch up groups and support in class is offered to children to develop understanding of concepts introduced in the lesson.

Gaps in learning in maths are identified through assessments and a programme of work is followed to develop understanding in these areas. Closing the gap support groups are run to address this need.

Developing understanding at greater depth where appropriate

Reading support
Daily reading programme to develop fluency and accuracy.
High frequency words practice through precision teaching
Phonics programmes – toe by toe, letters and sounds, read,write inc, Phonographix
Comprehension

Spelling support
High frequency words
Spelling programmes – Stareway to Spelling

Speech and language development using programmes set by speech and language specialist.

Occupational therapy

Training

There is regular training for support staff in school and in support groups and courses.
Access to support, training and assessment from the Hampshire Educational Psychology service

Maths teaching

All children will be taught in Year groups for maths to enable the progress of all and smaller groups to support pupil premium children.

English teaching

All children will be taught in Year groups for maths to enable the progress of all and smaller groups to support pupil premium children.

Funding for trips, residential visits, school clubs for children eligible for FSM.

What is the impact of Pupil Premium?

Attainment 2015-16

<p><u>Early years</u> 100% pupil premium children achieved a Good Level of Development (GLD) in Year R. This compared to 80% children in the cohort</p>
<p><u>Year 1- Phonics screening</u> All pupil premium children achieved the required level in the phonics screening.</p>
<p><u>Key stage 1 SATs</u> Reading: 100% achieved expected level, 25% achieved greater depth Writing: 75% achieved expected level, 25% achieved greater depth Maths: 75% achieved expected level, 75% achieved greater depth</p>
<p><u>Key stage 2 SATs</u> Reading: 100% achieved expected progress and greater depth Writing: 100% achieved expected progress Maths: 100% achieved expected progress and greater depth</p>
<p><u>Summary of impact</u> Full inclusivity for pupils eligible for pupil premium with uptake of trips and residential visits. All pupil premium children attended a club except one who joined part way through the year.</p> <p>ELSA support develops self esteem. Behaviour of children receiving ELSA support improved. Attendance and punctuality good and in line with that of the school. Successful transfer of pupils to secondary school</p> <p>Achievement for children in Year R outstanding. Achievement at Key stage 1 good or outstanding. Achievement at key stage 2 good in maths and reading.</p> <p>It is to be noted there are very small numbers of Pupil premium children so one child can have a very big impact on percentages. For this reason progress and achievement is always looked at on an individual basis.</p>
<p><u>Monitoring impact</u> All pupil premium children are discussed at tracking meeting held termly and progress and achievement is monitored</p> <p>Pupil premium children with SEN have an IEP. Their achievement and progress is reviewed termly and meetings are held with parents termly</p> <p>Key stage leaders report progress of pupil premium children termly and at the end of the year.</p> <p>Governors monitor impact of pupil premium</p>
